Revised Appendix 5B

Paladin Energy Ltd (ASX:PDN OTCQX: PALAF) (**Paladin**) is pleased to provide a revised Appendix 5B for the period ended 31 December 2021. Section 7 of the Appendix 5B, *Financing facilities*, has been revised to include details of various loans that have been provided by each of Paladin and CNNC Overseas Uranium Holding Limited (**CNNC**) to Langer Heinrich Uranium Pty Ltd (**LHU**) (**Shareholder Loans**). A consequential change has been made to Section 8 of the Appendix 5B, *Estimated cash available for future operating activities*.

Total shareholder loans of US\$368.6m have been provided to LHU by Paladin and its wholly-owned subsidiary companies (US\$285.7M) and CNNC (US\$82.9M). Paladin holds a 75% shareholding in LHU, and CNNC a 25% shareholding. Paladin's Shareholder Loans to LHU are eliminated on accounting consolidation, such that only the Shareholder Loans provided by CNNC to LHU are detailed in the Appendix 5B.

Under the Shareholders' Agreement between Paladin and CNNC each shareholder has agreed not to demand repayment of the Shareholder Loans without the prior written consent of the other shareholder. Repayment is dependent on LHU generating sufficient free cash flows to repay the loans. These loans have not been guaranteed by Paladin and are unsecured.

Details of these Shareholder Loans have previously been disclosed by Paladin in its financial statements, and most recently in its annual report for the year ending 30 June 2021.

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About Paladin

Paladin Energy Limited (ASX: PDN OTCQX:PALAF) is an Australian listed uranium company focused on maximising the value of its 75% stake in the Langer Heinrich Uranium mine in Namibia.

Langer Heinrich is a globally significant, long-life operation, having already produced over $43Mlb\ U_3O_8$ to date. Operations at Langer Heinrich were suspended in 2018 due to low uranium prices.

Beyond Langer Heinrich, the Company also owns a large global portfolio of uranium exploration and development assets. Nuclear power remains a cost-effective, low carbon option for electricity generation.
