

## NYMAGEE DISTRICT EXPLORATION UPDATE

Aurelia Metals Limited (ASX: AMI) ('Aurelia' or 'the Company') is pleased to provide further details of significant results from its recent exploration programs at the Federation deposit and the Lancelot prospect in the Nymagee District, NSW.

### Highlights

#### 1. Federation North Offset (Federation West)

Visual drill core results for diamond drill hole FDD215 at the Federation deposit, were previously released (see ASX announcement dated 5 April 2024 'Federation Exploration Update'). The Company has now received final assays for this drillhole, confirming a spectacular intercept. This result further supports the Company's excitement at the potential discovery of a faulted northern offset to the Federation deposit and the possibility that this offset may provide a material extension of mineralisation to the west.

**4.6m @ 33.9% Zn, 20.3% Pb, 1.6% Cu, 0.9g/t Au and 38g/t Ag in FDD215 from 414.7m**

#### 2. Lancelot Surface Geochemistry

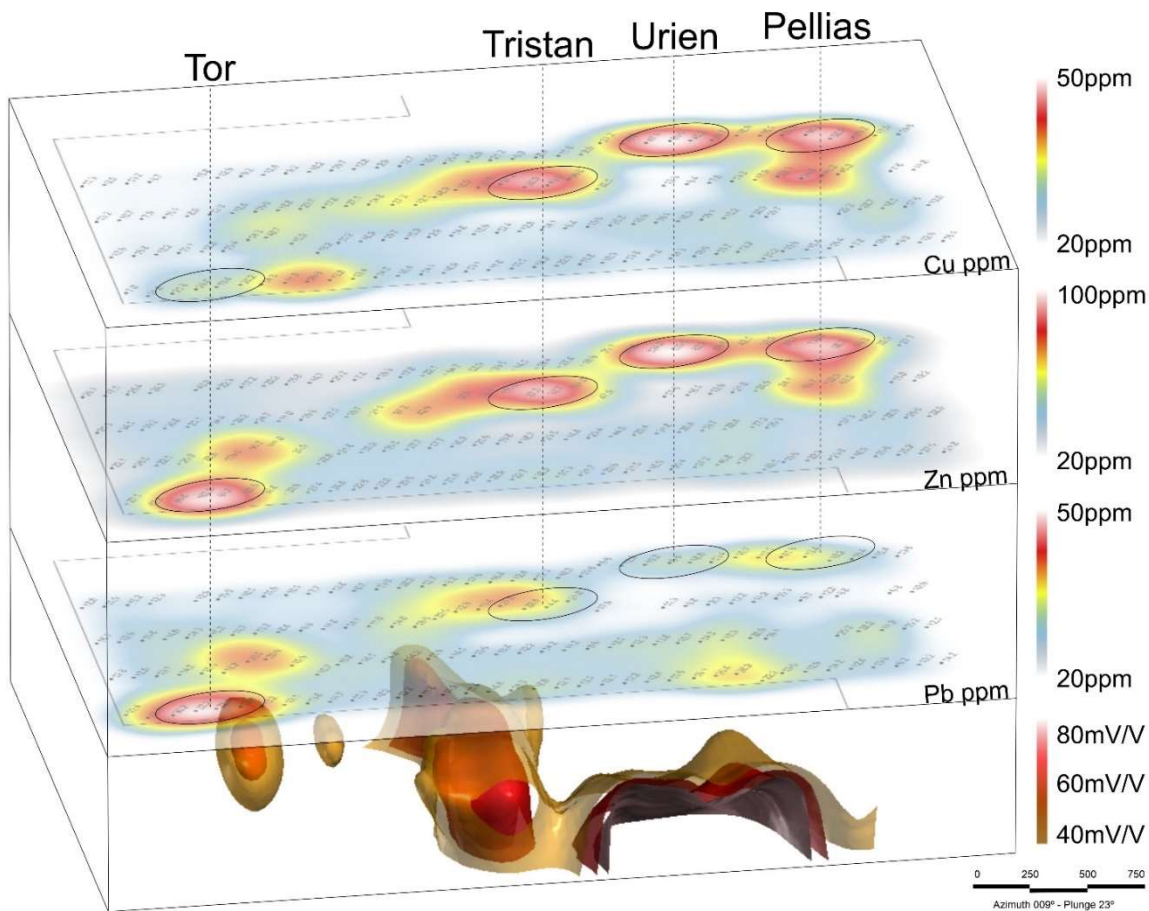
Results from a combined soil geochemical survey and auger drill program have now been received. Combining these with promising geophysical survey results (see ASX announcement dated 18 January 2023 'Survey Results'), a number of highly prospective target areas have been defined for follow-up drill testing, planned for FY25.

**Commenting on these exploration results, Chief Development and Technical Officer, Andrew Graham said:**

“The drill core of Federation hole FDD215 is visually spectacular. The assay results from this hole, that we released today, confirm an outstanding intercept, even when considered relative to very high-grade holes into the Federation deposit.

What is more exciting is that this drilling points to a faulted offset of the deposit, some 140m to the north. This offset has the potential to extend the Federation deposit materially to the west.

Additionally, the interpretation of soil auger work at the Lancelot prospect, combined with earlier geophysical results, has identified a number of exciting targets. These are planned to be drill tested during FY25.

Lancelot is a great example of our systematic and staged approach to exploration, with the results of low-cost surface soils supporting targeted geophysical surveys and then more detailed bottom-of-hole geochemical analysis. This approach allows the Company to cost-effectively work our premier landholding in the Cobar Basin.”

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## 1. North Offset (Federation West)

Technical concept drilling at Federation West, to assess the potential for an offset orebody due to strike discontinuity, intersected significant massive sulphide mineralisation in diamond drillhole FDD215, approximately 140 metres north of the strike of the main deposit (see ASX announcement dated 5 April 2024 'Federation Exploration Update').

This drilling has demonstrated the further potential for high-grade mineralisation to continue west, offset to the north from the strike of the main orebody.

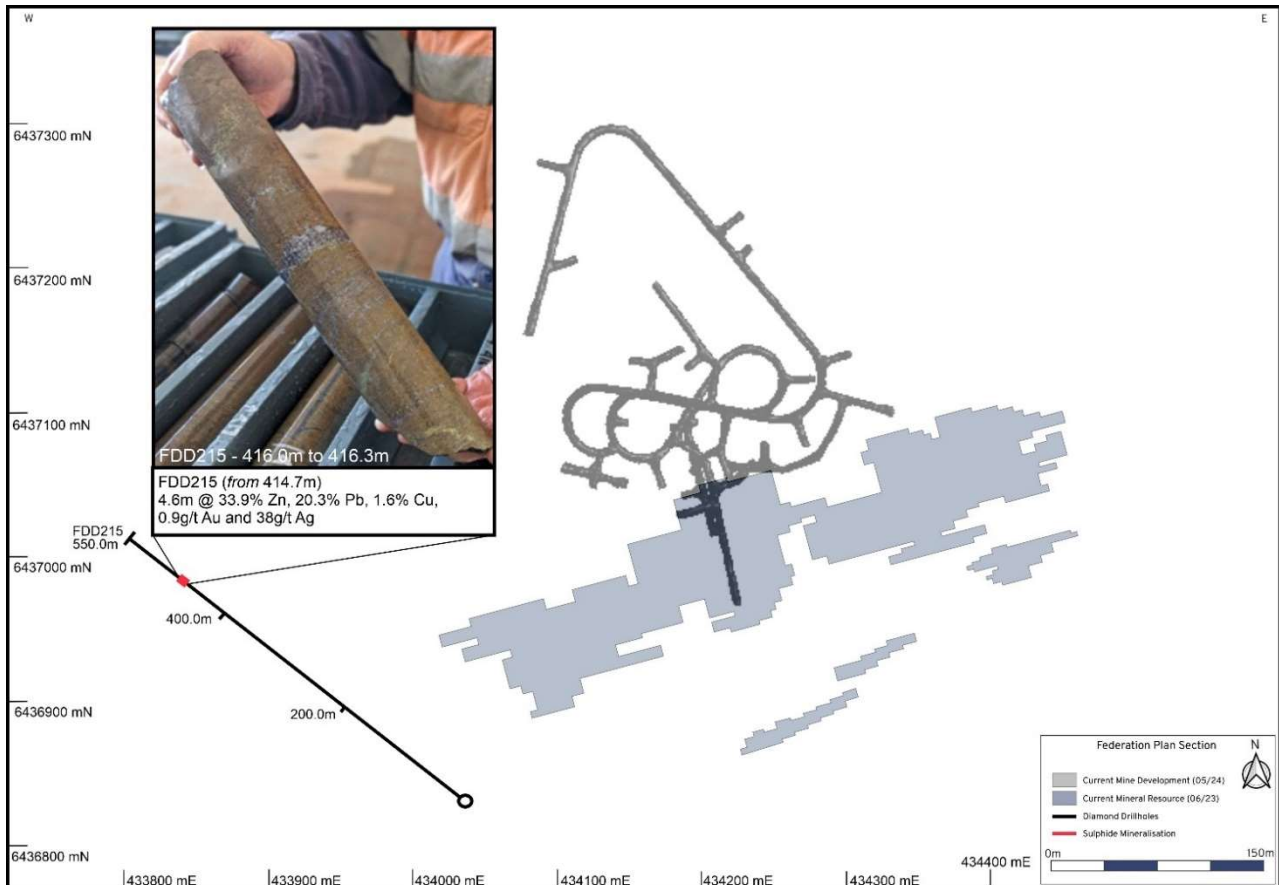


Figure 3: Plan section of the Federation deposit showing drillhole FDD215 with a significant intersection, current mine development at end of May 2024 and the current mineral resource outline.

Assay results for FDD215 have been received, confirming the exceptional grade of the mineralisation intercepted in the hole.

Base and precious metal mineralisation encountered in FDD215 is consistent in metallogeny to the main Federation deposit with an average zinc/lead ratio of 2:1. Grades encountered are very high and the alteration intensity remains strong, indicating mineralisation has significant potential to extend along strike and down dip.

Geophysical, structural and historical drilling data has been reviewed recently in light of the new intersections in FDD215. The currently unnamed fault (Federation West Fault) which has offset Federation West to the north appears to intersect the Dominion prospect when projected south by 1km. Exploration potential at the Dominion prospect will be re-considered with the new structural information.

The Federation West program concludes the FY24 Nymagee District exploration campaign. Further exploration drilling will commence early in FY25.

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## 2. Lancelot Surface Geochemistry

Following the successful Induced Polarisation (IP) survey (see ASX announcement dated 18 January 2023 ‘Survey Results’) the Company has completed extensive surface soil sampling and auger drilling with Bottom of Hole (BOH) sampling to improve surface geochemical resolution within the Lancelot area.

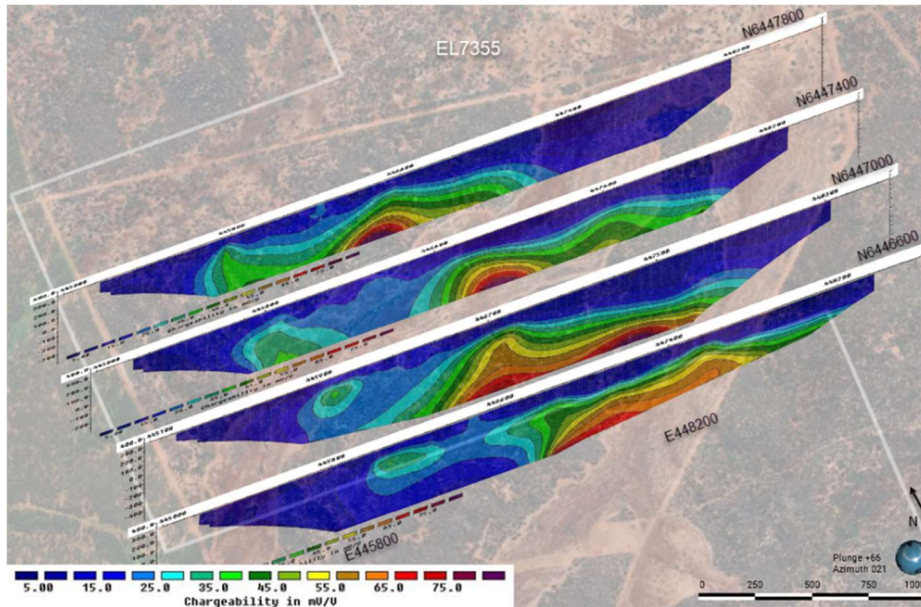


Figure 4: Lancelot Pole-Dipole IP survey lines and chargeability pseudosections (0.0 mV/V – 85.0 mV/V range) with potential sulphides represented by hot colours.

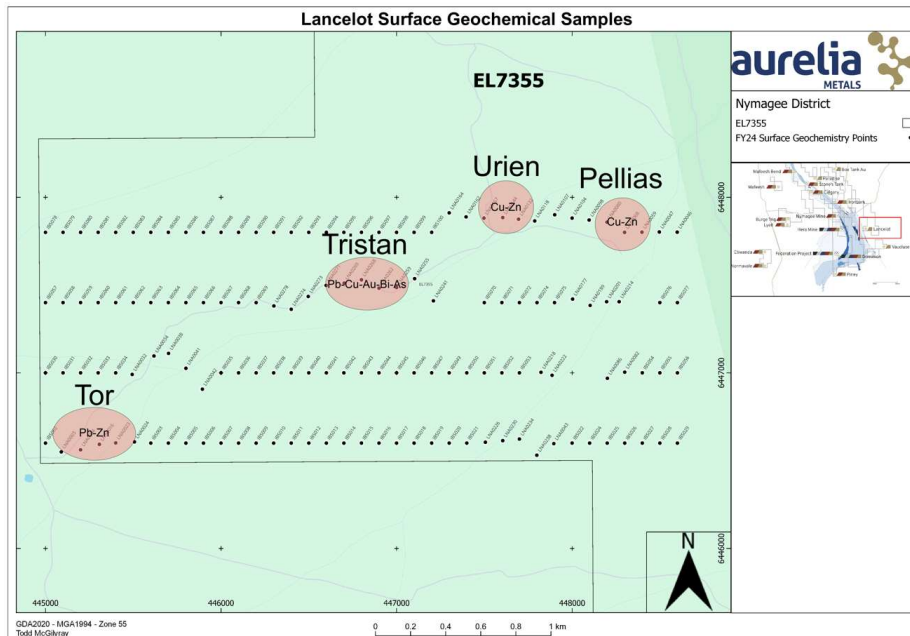


Figure 5: Lancelot Soils and Auger Sample locations and identified target areas.

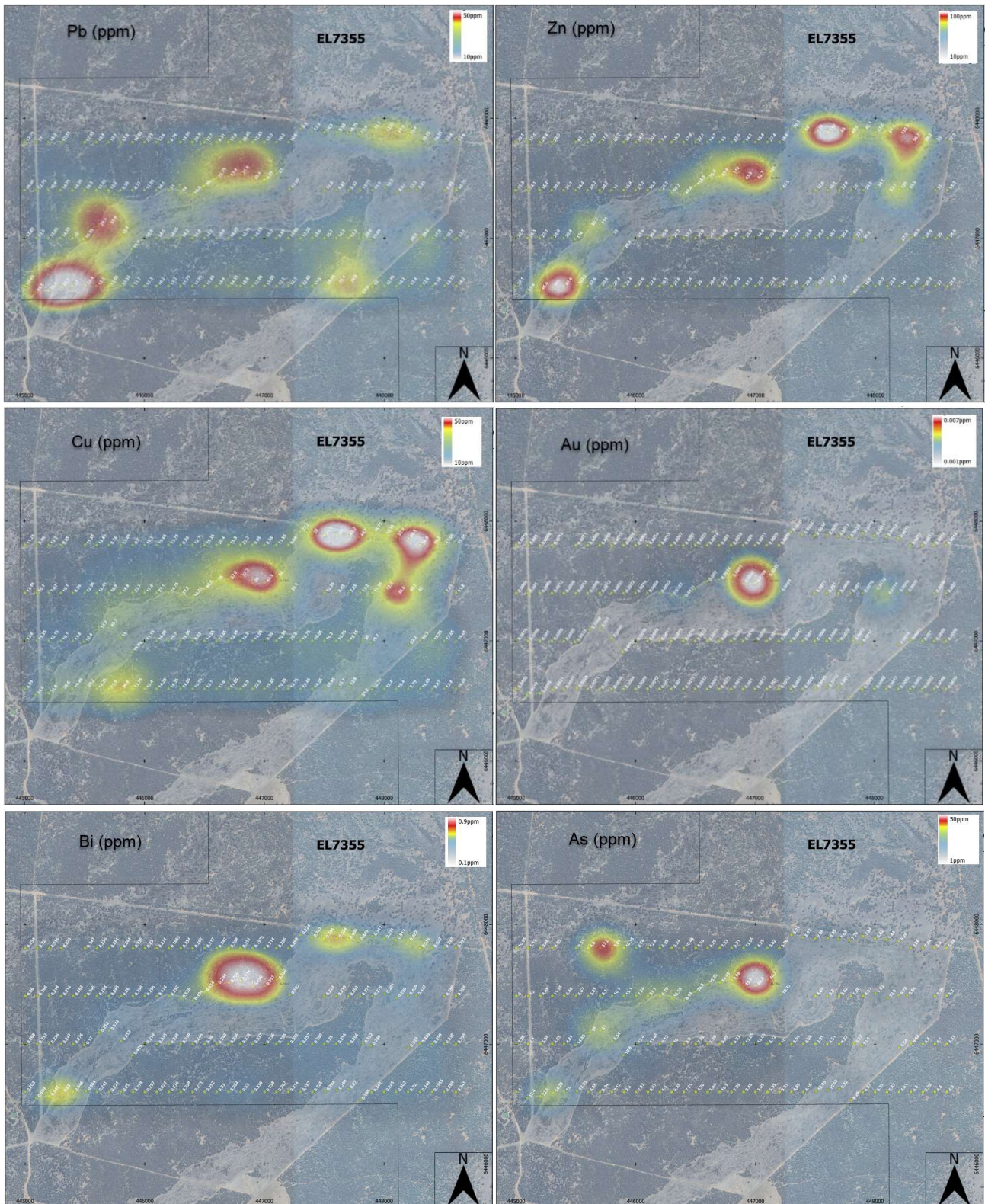
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Figures 6-11: Surface geochemical sample point locations with assay results and KDE heatmaps with a linear colour stretch.

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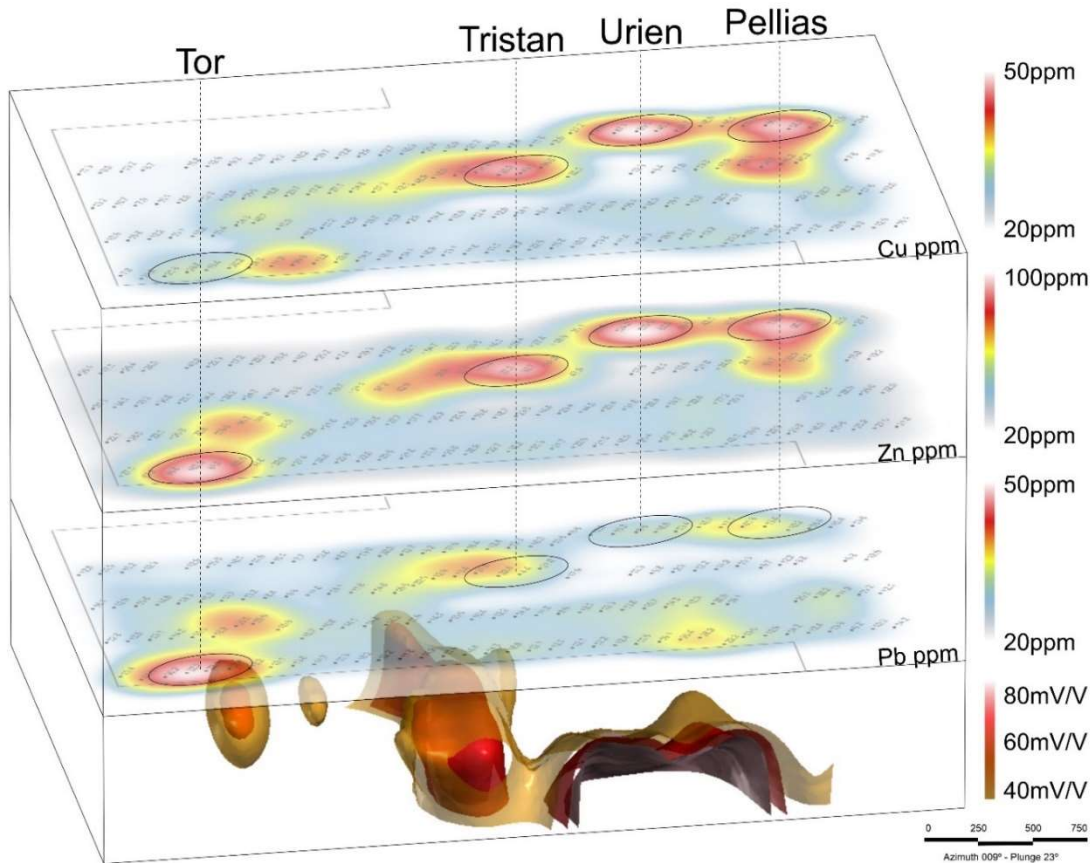
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The combined geophysical and geochemistry program results have generated four key target areas to be tested by future drilling, identified as Tristan, Tor, Urien and Pellias, listed in order of importance.

Each target area has been jointly assessed using surface geochemistry, results from the IP survey and the existing magnetic dataset.

Target areas and rationale are described below:

**Tor** – Combined Pb-Zn geochemical anomalism on the western extent of the IP survey, located on the western shoulder of a regional magnetic high and chargeability high to 60mV/V.

**Tristan** – Combined Pb-Cu-Au-Bi-As geochemical anomaly located directly above a very strong chargeability high up to 80mV/V and positioned 200m northeast of a discrete magnetic high.

**Urien** – Combined Cu-Zn geochemical anomaly located above a potential continuation of a northward diving chargeability high up to 60mV/V depth extent, associated with a minor increase in magnetic response in a broader magnetic low.

**Pellias** – Combined Cu-Zn geochemical anomaly located outside of the IP survey area to the east, associated with a magnetic low.

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*Auger drillhole information and soil sample information is not considered material due to trace level assay and absent weighted average (downhole width) grades applied to samples. Reported assays are near surface or bottom of hole intervals only to represent the residual character of the regolith and subsurface geology. Assays will be used to target diamond drilling in the future, and any possible significant intersections will be reported if material.*

### 3. Location

Federation is located 10 kilometres (km) south of the Hera processing plant and 15km south of the Nymagee township in the Nymagee District. The Federation Mine is being developed on Mining Lease (ML) 1862, held by Hera Resources Pty Ltd, a wholly owned subsidiary of Aurelia. Current exploration drilling occurs wholly within ML1862.

The Lancelot prospect area is located 8km east of the Hera Mine on EL7355, held by Peak Gold Mines Pty Ltd, a wholly owned subsidiary of Aurelia.

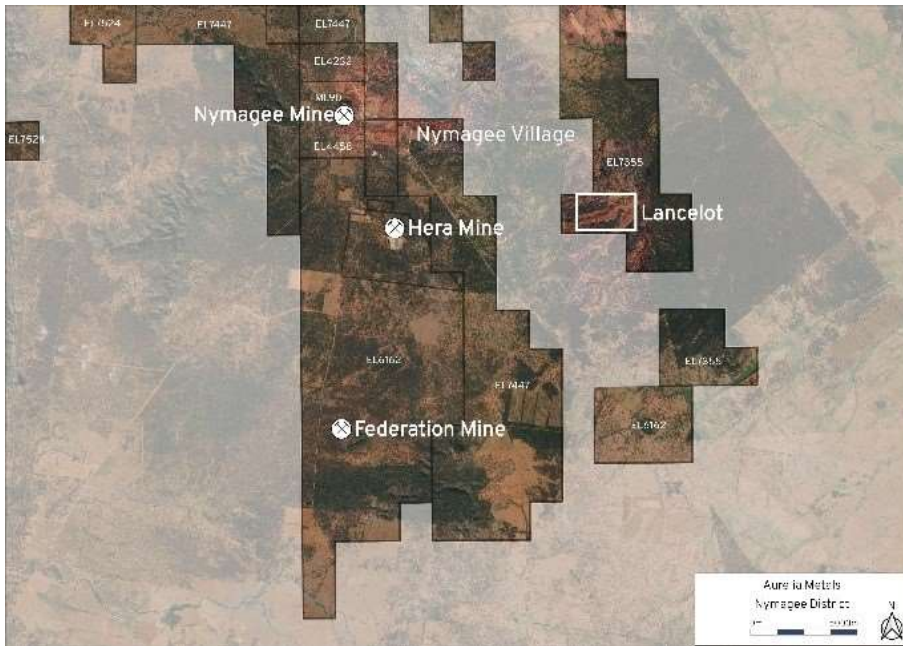
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Figures 14: Regional location map of Federation Mine and the Lancelot prospect.

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## About Aurelia

Aurelia Metals Limited (ASX: AMI) is an Australian mining and exploration company with a highly strategic landholding, and two operating mines in New South Wales (NSW). The Peak Mine is in the Cobar Basin in western NSW, and the Dargues Mine is in south-eastern NSW. The Hera mining operation, also located in the Cobar Basin, has ceased and the surface facilities have been placed into care and maintenance.

In addition, Aurelia has two consented high grade development projects. The polymetallic Federation Project is currently under construction, with development of the Great Cobar copper deposit to follow.

In FY23, Aurelia produced 86,284 ounces of gold at a Group All-In Sustaining Cost of A\$2,315 per ounce. The Peak Mine's cost base benefits from substantial by-product revenue credits from base metal production (including zinc, lead and copper).
