Appendix 4C Quarterly Cash Flow and Market Update

Australian Dairy Nutritionals Limited (**AHF** or the **Group**) today lodged its Appendix 4C and provided a review of the Group's progress for the third quarter ended 31 March 2025 (**Q3 FY25**).

Quarterly Activity Report (QAR)

Financial Update

Revenue of nutritional powders in Q3 FY25 were a record \$736k which was a 490% increase v the same period in FY24 and a 139% increase v the previous quarter. This result reflects initial pipeline orders for the launch of the Future brand in China and sales to Vietnam and Nutura Organic. Production in the Camperdown facility has increased in line with sales demand and results are in line with current expectations. This is a very pleasing start to achieving the objective of fundamentally changing the trajectory of the business and sales momentum which is anticipated to continue in Q4 FY25.

Total sales revenue in Q3 FY25 was \$1.595m which was a 28% increase compared with the same period last year.

Net cash outflows from operations were in line with expectations at \$1.15m for Q3 FY25. The Group ended Q3 FY25 with cash holdings of \$3.09m (Q2 FY25: \$4.48m). In addition, the Group has access to a funding facility of \$1.22m should it be required.

Directors, being related parties of the Group, were paid remuneration in the amount of \$79k during the March quarter which is consistent with the previous quarter.

Future brand – China launch

The Group announced on 6 September 2024 that it has entered an exclusive supply partnership with Mutree Science and Technology Limited, for distribution and marketing of AHF infant formula and other products in China. It was also announced that an agreement was reached to use the M2C global shopping app which has unique functionality for the o2o channel in China, and is expected to be pivotal in building distribution, gaining trial and driving brand awareness.

The Future brand launch that was announced at the 27 November 2024 AGM is progressing well. In addition to the premium positioning of Future Organic A2 Protein, it is confirmed that the Future A2 Protein brand will include the HMO ingredient (Human Milk Oligosaccharides). The premium positioning of the Future brand will drive brand aspiration as well as differentiation and will be the key driver in the Groups ambition of fundamentally improving gross margins over the longer term.

The Future brand was recently presented to key Chinese influencers in Australia and MBS distributors and store owners in China. The response was very favourable which gives management and the Board confidence in the potential of the brand strategy to fundamentally change the shape & mix of the business to a nutritional growth focus. Pipeline sales have been

shipped to China in Q3 of FY25 as planned. The roll-out of our distribution and consumer communication plan commenced in Q3 as planned.

The release of this announcement was authorised by the Board of AHF.
