

# Quarterly Activity Report and Appendix 4C

for the period ending 30 September 2025

### Highlights

- Six new data sharing & IP (or proof of concept) agreements signed with large NSW clubs, bringing the total to nine signed agreements
- More than 100 additional clubs have also registered interest with Cherryhub since the product launch at the Australasian Gaming Expo
- ConnectID now available through the BNDRY platform
- Cameron Beavis agrees to join the Board of Directors
- Payble share sale generates \$1.6 million in non-dilutive working capital
- Debt-to-equity conversion reduces unsecured loan to less than \$0.4 million

**30 October 2025** - <u>Identitii (ASX:ID8)</u> ('**Identitii'**, '**the Company**') (ASX:ID8) is pleased to release its Appendix 4C for the three months ending 30 September 2025 and provides an update on its progress during the period.

Commenting on the quarter, John Rayment, CEO of Identitii, said: "Our collaboration with Cherryhub, first announced in April of this year, continues to gather pace and momentum. In just six months, the Company and Cherryhub have together mapped out the problems felt by a large underserved market; designed, built and launched the first iteration of the solution at one of the industry's biggest national events; signed data sharing & IP (or proof of concept) agreements with nine potentially early adopters; and fielded genuine inbound interest from over 100 more.

"We are also thrilled that Cameron Beavis has again confirmed his long-term support for the Company and will join our Board of Directors next month. In addition to providing capital, Cameron has direct experience in starting, scaling and exiting software businesses, and his contribution to the Board will no doubt be significant. Personally, I



am looking forward to working more closely with him, and I know the rest of our Board shares that feeling. There is more to be done, but our trajectory is very exciting, and we are looking forward to converting this into commercial agreements commencing next quarter."

### **Cameron Beavis agrees to join the Board**

Cameron Beavis, Identitii's largest shareholder, has agreed to join the Board of Directors as a Non-Executive Director. His appointment is expected to occur next month.

Mr. Beavis is a highly experienced Australian businessman and entrepreneur, recognised for his significant contributions to the technology sector and to corporate governance, notably over two decades as Managing Director & CEO, evolving to Executive Board Chair of GlobalX Group, until its acquisition by Dye & Durham in 2021.

### **Cherry Hub collaboration update**

During the quarter, the Company launched its new financial crime compliance solution tailored to Australia's clubs and pubs, in partnership with Cherryhub, at the Australasian Gaming Expo in Sydney. Over the course of three days, the solution was presented to leadership teams from clubs and pubs all over Australia, and follow-up campaigns facilitated by Cherryhub have since received more than 100 expressions of interest.

Additionally, the Company and Cherryhub have been working with a select number of clubs to develop the solution, and during the quarter six more of them signed the data sharing & IP (or proof of concept) agreement, that enables customer data and internal processes to be securely shared. The platform will ultimately consume the customer data, and largely automate the internal processes, in bringing the solution to market.


These data sharing & IP (or proof of concept) agreements are a critical part of the process and really serve two purposes. They allow BNDRY and Cherryhub firstly to access the information needed to build and tailor the solution, and secondly to give clubs and pubs a live instance of the platform with their own customer data. They are a natural precursor to commercial revenue generating agreements.

The Company expects revenue to flow from these engagements next quarter and will update shareholders as it progresses.



### **BNDRY platform update**

BNDRY is the single hub for modern financial crime compliance teams to **Know**, **Monitor**, **Report** and **Store** risk data. Below is an image from <u>bndry.net</u> that shows the platform's full capability and the different services it orchestrates, into one home screen for compliance teams.



Most compliance tools are designed for large financial institutions with teams of specialists working in silos on individual parts of a complete compliance program. However, for more than 17,000 regulated businesses in Australia that are not large financial institutions, this means building and operating a compliance program with multiple different solutions designed to address only parts of a comprehensive program. The operational cost and complexity is challenging.

Identitii has integrated a range of third-party services into BNDRY, to enable the platform to manage all customer risk data and processes, for the entire compliance lifecycle from onboarding to long-term data retention, including know your customer (KYC), enhanced customer due diligence (ECDD) and transaction monitoring (TMS) services from ConnectID, Hawk, Ion Analytics KYC6, RapidID, Simple KYC and Truuth. Together these augment BNDRY's native transaction reporting and data storage capability.



### **Update on patent infringement claim**

Work has commenced with BDIP Law, the Company's US lawyers, following last quarter's court order directing Identitii and JPMC to file a joint proposed scheduling order to move the patent infringement claim towards an outcome. The Company is working with BDIP Law to review its extensive data store and retrieve catalogued documents required to progress the claim.

Notwithstanding this, the claim is still awaiting a ruling on a motion to dismiss. As with previous quarters, the Company hopes to receive a ruling soon, and maintains its belief it has a strong claim for patent infringement, backed by an extensive catalogue of evidence that has already passed its first major milestone, with the USPTO rejecting patent validity challenges from JPMC.

### **Identitii sells Payble share holding**

During the quarter, the Company sold its remaining shares in Payble Pty Ltd ("Payble") to OIF Ventures for \$1.6 million, to extend the Company's runway. The non-dilutive funds from the sale will be used to accelerate the development and go-to-market strategy of the BNDRY platform, which is seeing significant interest from Australia's clubs and pubs industry, following the Company entering a partnership with Cherryhub.

### **Debt-to-Equity Conversion**

During the quarter, the Company issued 45,000,000 fully paid ordinary shares at 0.9 cents per share utilising ASX Listing Rule 7.1 placement capacity, in consideration of \$405k as part settlement of the \$800k outstanding interest free, unsecured loan from Beauvais Capital as trustee for The Reginal Hector Trust.

The shares were issued to Arnott Park Investments Pty Ltd as nominee for Beauvais Capital Pty Ltd as trustee for The Reginal Hector Trust, noting that following the new share issue, Cameron Beavis and his related entities hold 29.92% of total capital on issue, being 1.08% higher than the percentage held six months ago and therefore within the 3% creep provision of the Corporations Act (Cth) 2001.

### Q4 FY25 cash flow

Receipts from customers for Q1 FY26 were \$100K (Q1 FY25: \$91K), an increase of 9% year on year. Payments to employees and suppliers for Q1 FY26 were \$1.44M (Q1 FY25: \$1.28M), an increase of 13% year on year, reflecting slight increased expenditure on the work occurring with the Cherryhub partnership. Operating expenditure control remains a



top, ongoing priority for Management, who routinely seek to optimise return-on-capital where possible. Payments to related parties included payments to Non-Executive

Directors, and payments of the CEO salary.

The Company closed the quarter with a cash balance of \$1.3M (previous quarter: \$1.1M).

**Director resignation** 

During the quarter, Simon Griffin resigned as Non-Executive Director. Tim Phillipps,

Executive Chair of Identitii, said of the announcement: "Since his appointment to our

Board in June 2022, Simon has made significant contributions to our governance of

finance, risk and strategy. He leaves the Company to focus solely on his next business

endeavour, and we offer him our sincere thanks and best wishes for the future."

### Beauvais Capital Loan

On 29th July 2025, the Company entered into a new loan facility in the sum of \$800,000 with Beauvais Capital atf The Reginal Hector Trust. The funds were borrowed to repay the Company's R&D funding facility with Mitchell Asset Management, which was repaid in full during the guarter.

During the quarter, a partial loan repayment of \$405,000 was made via the issue of 45,000,000 fully paid ordinary shares at a price of \$0.009 per share.

The loan is interest free and unsecured.

Answer: No. Identitii does not expect that it will continue to have the current level of net operating cash flows for the upcoming quarters. The Company has developed the BNDRY platform and has partnered with Cherryhub to assist clubs and pubs with their compliance requirements. Identitii expects to generate revenues from this offering over the coming quarters. Identitii is also expecting its R&D rebate in the coming quarter.

Answer: Yes, Identitii is actively exploring funding options, should further funds be required, and it has the full support of its majority shareholder.
